

Honor Flight - Long Island


On May 4th, Post 833 was at MacArthur Airport for Honor Flight. - Long Island.

AMERICAN LEGION BOYS STATE

Since 1935, American Legion Boys State has been one of the country's most revered and selective government instruction programs, teaching high school students about the operation of local, country and state governments. Fifty American Legion departments conduct this program, serving more than 17,000 young men each year. The American Legion Auxiliary sponsors a similar program for young women called Girls State.

At American Legion Boys State, young men learn about the rights, privileges, duties and responsibilities of a franchised citizen. Elected and appointed local officials offer participants objective, practical training in city, county and state governance, and activities are conducted such as legislative sessions, court proceedings, law enforcement presentations, assemblies, band, chorus and recreational programs.

American Legion posts select participants to attend their respective Boys State program after receiving recommendations from school officials. Usually posts, local businesses or community organizations pay the cost of attendance.

American Legion Boys State participants go on to achieve success in a variety of fields. Notable alumni include astronaut Neil Armstrong, basketball legend Michael Jordan and national television news journalist Tom Brokaw.









Honor Flight - Long Island

On May 29, 2004, President Bush dedicated the World War II Memorial to honor "The Greatest Generation," 59 years after the end of WWII. One year later, the Honor Flight Program was inaugurated.

Earl Morse and Jeff Miller, co-founders of Honor Flight, realized that many World War II veterans would never have the opportunity to visit the memorial that was erected in their honor.

It is the intention of Honor Flight Long Island to honor as many of our fellow Long Islanders, who helped to preserve our freedom, as we can by providing them a free trip to visit their memorial. Along with WWII, we are now taking Korean War, Vietnam War and other conflict veterans to Washington D.C.

New York State Cold War Certificate

To whom awarded:

The Cold War Certificate may be awarded to any current New York State citizen or a person who was a New York State citizen while serving in the Armed Forces of the United States during the Cold War period, 2 September 1945 to 26 December 1991, whose entire service was honorable.

Standards:

This certificate may be awarded only to those persons whose discharge certificate indicates service under the conditions of "honorable" (Honorable Discharge) or "under honorable conditions" (General Discharge under Honorable Conditions).

This certificate may be awarded posthumously to a designated survivor of the deceased. Not more than one certificate shall be awarded to any one person. This is a one-time issue.

How awarded:

Applications for the New York State Cold War Certificate will be made using **DMNA Form 105**.

Posthumous applications will be submitted using the same mechanisms, using **DMNA Form 105-1**.

You will need to use Adobe Reader (or Adobe Acrobat) to view the applications above. Adobe Reader can be downloaded for free from https://get.adobe.com/reader/

Applications may be submitted By Mail to: Division of Military and Naval Affairs, ATTN: MNGA-AWD, 330 Old Niskayuna Road Latham, NY 12110

or electronically by Email to:ng.ny.nyarng.list.cold-war@army.mil

For security reasons, email attachments must be in 'PDF', 'JPG' or 'GIF' format. Attachments in any other format are blocked by the email system.

All requests will be sent to the New York Division of Military and Naval Affairs with supporting documents attached/enclosed to validate service during the Cold War period.

Documentation will include a copy of the recipient's Report of Separation (i.e., WD AGO Form 53-55, DD Form 214, or NGB Form 22, etc.). Documentation must include a discharge certificate indicating the character of service as "honorable" (Honorable Discharge) or "under honorable conditions" (General Discharge under Honorable Conditions). Ensure documentation submitted clearly indicates New York State residency while on duty in the Armed Forces during the applicable dates.

Do not send original proof of military service documents. Please ensure only the last 4 digits of the Social Security number are visible. It is also recommended the Date of Birth be crossed off.

If you do not have, in your possession, the required documentation necessary for eligibility or require confirmation of your federal service, you may request a copy of your service record by writing to:

National Personnel Records Center, Veterans Special Actions Division, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132.

Application for New York State Cold War Recognition Certificate

Privacy Notice

Authority: Military Law, section 247.

Principal Purpose: To secure sufficient information from an applicant or a requester to determine eligibility and to process requests for the Cold War Recognition Certificate.

Routine Uses: Information is used for official purposes within the Division of Military and Naval Affairs; specifically, to process requests for Cold War Certificates. This information may be used in accordance with established uses for the Division of Military and Naval Affairs.

Disclosure: Disclosure of the last four (4) digits of the Social Security Number and other personal information is voluntary. However, failure to provide complete information may hinder proper identification of the requester, and may prevent the agency from determining eligibility of the requester for the Cold War Certificate.

<u>Instructions</u>: Fill out this application and mail with <u>supporting documentation</u> to the Division of Military and Naval Affairs, ATTN: MNGA-AWD, with your proof of military service. Acceptable supporting documents include any official government or military document that contains the recipient's name, address indicating New York State residency, last four numerals of the recipient's Social Security Number, and dates of service showing at least one day of service during the Cold War era (September 2, 1945 to December 26, 1991). Examples of acceptable supporting documentation include DD Form 214, WD AGO 53-55, and NGB Form 22. **DO NOT SEND ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS.**



Lifetime Liberty Pass



Starting April 1, 2024, New York veterans and Gold Star families will be granted free access to state parks, campgrounds, historic sites and recreational day areas throughout the state, thanks to an expansion of the Lifetime Liberty Pass Program, the governor's office announced.



This program will now give the following benefits:

- Free vehicle parking at New York State Parks and DEC-operated campgrounds, day use areas, boat launch sites, historic sites, arboretums, and park preserves
- No greens fees at State Park-operated golf courses
- No swimming pool entrance fees at State Park-operated pools
- Discounted campsite and cabin rentals at State Park and DEC-operated campgrounds

Gold Star Family Members will receive the program's benefits when they present a Lifetime Liberty Pass card to employees at staffed parks. Lifetime Liberty Pass applications will be available on the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historical Preservation's website starting on April 1. Veterans who have a veteran status designation on their New York State DMV ID can present their ID to employees and don't need to apply for a card.

The lifetime pass covers entrance fees for a driver and all passengers in a personal vehicle (or passholder and up to three adults at sites that charge per person) at national parks and national wildlife refuges, as well as standard amenity fees at national forests and grasslands, and at lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Veterans can present one of the four forms of The new lifetime pass for Gold Star Families and Military Veterans provides free entrance to national parks

and other federal recreation areas.







VA Expands Burial Benefits



The VA last year announced new burial allowance rates for veterans who have died in nonservice-related incidents since October.

VA announced several updates to burial benefits aimed at providing support to veterans and their families. These updates, according to VA, reflect the department's commitment to honoring U.S. veterans around the world.

TRANSPORTATION EXPENSES

In the past, VA covered costs for transporting remains to eligible national cemeteries. Now, this benefit has been extended to include transportation expenses to state and tribal veteran cemeteries.

"[For service-related deaths], VA will pay up to \$2,000 toward burial expenses for deaths on or after Sept. 11, 2001, or up to \$1,500 for deaths prior to Sept. 11, 2001," according to VA. "If the veteran is buried in a VA national cemetery, some or all of the cost of transporting the deceased may be reimbursed."

For nonservice-related deaths, VA will pay a \$948 burial allowance and \$948 for a plot if the veteran died on or after Oct. 1, 2023. If the veteran died between Jan. 5, 2023, and Oct. 1, 2023, VA would pay an \$893 burial allowance and \$893 for a plot. PLAN 'END-OF-LIFE BENEFITS' NOW

VA Under Secretary for Benefits Joshua Jacobs noted in a VA press release that in fiscal year 2022, VA delivered more than 84,000 burial benefits to families.

"Expanding burial benefits means we are able to ensure veterans are honored in their final resting place and assist their family, caregivers and survivors during the difficult time of their loved one's passing," Jacobs said.

VA's national cemeteries provide benefits for traditional casket or cremation burials. For eligible veterans and family members, VA national cemetery burial benefits include:

- Opening and closing of the gravesite
- · Inscribed headstones or markers
- Burial flag
- Award of the Presidential Memorial Certificate
- Perpetual care of the gravesite

 For those being pleased in private

For those being placed in private cemeteries, benefits only include:

- Headstones, markers or medallions for the gravesite
- · Burial flag
- Presidential Memorial Certificate

VA also may provide burial allowances to assist with a family member's burial and funeral costs for those eligible. Final rest for combat hero

Lost remains of Army vet were found by niece

For nearly six decades, the remains of Army Sgt. George Moje Jr., a decorated combat veteran who served in Korea and during the aftermath of World War II, sat abandoned in a cold, sterile Queens storage locker - his years of meritorious service to the nation lost for generations.

The mystery of what had become of the uncle she'd never met confounded Diane Moje-Garcia of Ridge, sending her on a circuitous journey for answers that concludes on Friday as Sgt. Moje finally receives a military send-off during a Catholic Mass in Center Moriches and a burial service at Calverton National Ceme-

tery.
"It's the right thing to do," Moje-Garcia said Tuesday. "So many times, people are just forgotten. I want to give him what he deserves."

A hero in combat

George Moje, the oldest of two brothers raised in Jackson Heights, Queens, enlisted in the

After completing his basic training, Moje was sent to Japan, which was still occupied by Al-lied Forces after the end of the war. He was later awarded a World War II Victory Medal and the Army of Occupation Medal, records show.

Moje, who remained in the military, was later deployed to Korea with the Army's Third Infantry Division as a radio chief with the Communications Pla-

While records are scant regarding the details of Moje's service during the Korean War, he earned a Bronze Star for his time in combat between Jan. 25 and Sept. 7, 1951, a period when his unit was engaged in a series of legendary battles for control of a region that became known as "Heartbreak Ridge."

The Second Infantry Division, and its attached units, sustained 3,700 casualties - the North Koreans lost an estimated 25,000 soldiers - during the bloody battle. Records show Moje was honorably discharged from the Army on Oct. 19, 1951, after suffering a severe battlefield injury to his stomach. He later received the Combat Infantry Badge and the Korean Service Medal.

Moje's Bronze Star certificate states that he "molded his section into a highly effective and efficient unit, and constantly strove for improvement. His will-

ingness to work long hours after the normal duty day, training new replacements and giving them the full benefit of his own valuable combat knowledge, enabled them to meet and overcome the obstacles encountered on the battlefield and resulted in the formation of an exceptionally efficient radio section.

When he returned home, Moje struggled with complications from his injuries and later, a dependency on alcohol, said Moje-Garcia, whose son attends the Citadel, a military college in South Carolina. After years of visits to VA hospitals, Moje died on April 15, 1965, and was cre-

Moje's family, distraught over the untimely death, never claimed his remains following his Queens funeral service.

Instead, to honor his younger brother, William Moje, the father of Moje-Garcia, carried a copy of "Just for Today" poem from Al-Anon, a support group for people affected by al-coholism — in his wallet until his own death in 2019.

Long-hidden remains

After her father's death, Moje-Garcia came across paperwork from Frederick Funeral Home in Flushing, which handled her uncle's services decades earlier. She contacted the facility, hoping to discover the details of his disposition.

some sleuthing, she learned that her uncle's ashes had been kept for 58 years in the funeral home's storage locker.

"I just cried because I couldn't believe they had them for that long," Moje-Garcia said. "Sitting in a storage facility just breaks my heart.'

With the remains finally back in the family's hands, a Catholic Mass will be held on Friday at 10:45 a.m. at St. John The Evangelist Roman Catholic Church, followed by an interment at Calverton National Cemetery.

"This is a person who served their country and is now being put to rest in a place of dignity and honor," said Daniel Moloney, president of Moloney Family Funeral Homes, which is arranging the services.

Thomas Kilmartin, a retired colonel in the Army National Guard, helped Moje-Garcia, a family friend, navigate her uncle's military records and is working to obtain documents detailing the nature of his combat injuries.

"It's important that we recognize all service members who served this country. They de-serve a final resting place," said Kilmartin, who is traveling from his home in Georgia to speak at the service of Moje, whom he never met. "This is very important to the family, and it's very important to me.

Moje-Garcia is asking Long Island local veterans groups and motorcycle clubs — her uncle rode one - to assist in the funeral procession from the church to Calverton National Cemetery.

"I wish I could have met him. He died a year before I was born," she said. "But I'm honored and fascinated with what my uncle did and what a hero he was."
